We committed to raising our awareness, showing compassion and empathy, condemning racial inequality and violence, and advocating for change. We will continue to be part of the solution.





We focused on supporting our communities, whether by donating cookies to front line workers, creating masks, sending letters to nursing homes, collecting books for pop-up community libraries, or donating bike helmets, Girl Scouts kept our promise to make the world around us better.

The year was a true testament to the power of Girl Scouts and of our community. Outdoors



97% of Girl Scouts who've attended camp say the experience helped them improve their outdoor skills. When girls spend quality time outdoors and increase their exposure to nature, they thrive physically, emotionally, and intellectually.

When Girl Scouts get outside, they:


- Discover that they can better solve problems and overcome challenges

Life Skills

Girl Scouts are twice as likely to be community problem solvers and participate in civic engagement activities. Beginning with Civic Engagement and expanding to Healthy Living, Communication Skills, Practical Skills, and Global Citizenship, Girl Scouts' foundational skills help girls grow as leaders and learn how to be active and informed members of their communities.

Entrepreneurship

91% of Girl Scouts want to be entrepreneurs in the future! Research shows that girls are actively interested in becoming entrepreneurs, developing financially stable futures, and using their skills to make a big impact on the world. However, there are stumbling blocks on a girl's path to entrepreneurship, including fear of failure, concerns about bringing



her big idea to life, and the perception that men are more likely to be entrepreneurs than women. By providing a foundation to learn important business skills, Girl Scouts is the perfect place to support young girls in exploring entrepreneurship as they develop into the leaders of tomorrow.

These are our promises to you.


- We know we do not have all the answers, but we pledge our commitment to navigating this path with you as allies and advocates for Black, Indigenous, and people of color in our community.

GIRL SCOUTING DURING A PANDEMIC

The world can be confusing and stressful, especially during an emergency like the COVID-19 pandemic, but Girl Scouts have always been known for facing new and even sometimes overwhelming challenges with optimism and creativity. That's why, even when we could no longer meet in person, Girl Scouting did not stop. Together we shifted to a new reality, moving meetings to virtual spaces, completing badges from home, and helping our communities in brand new ways.

Girl Scouts at Home

In early March 2020, GSSI went fully remote. To maintain programming while keeping our girls, volunteers, and staff safe, we, along with GSUSA introduced Girl Scouts at Home.

The GSSI Girl Scouts at Home experience is for both girls and adults. For girls, we developed badge programs for all grade levels that could easily be completed from home. This program was open to all girls in K-12, including non-members. Throughout the summer, a new badge series was added to our website each week. Thanks to a generous grant from Toyota, girls were able to request their earned badges at no cost through early August.



For adults, GSSI's Girl Scouts at Home program focuses on supporting parents, guardians, and volunteers as they navigate this new world. Resources include articles and tips specifically for parents and guardians, as well as tips for volunteers for supporting their troop in a virtual setting.

In addition to our local at-home programming, GSUSA also launched a movement-wide Girl Scouts at Home program that leveraged the resources of our nationwide network to present a variety of virtual events and programs. With Girl Scouts at Home, families everywhere can now access self-guided, free activities to keep them engaged and connected to their communities and the larger sisterhood of girls. This national platform reflects the exploration and interactive learning of Girl Scouts in a one-stop-shop format that lets both members and the public enjoy a variety of activities that cover STEM, Entrepreneurship, Life Skills, and the Outdoors.

The age-specific activities for girls of all grade levels are delivered through guided videos, text-based instructions, and downloadable information, making it seamless for families to incorporate into their daily lives. More program-based options continue to be added, allowing girls to earn badges, tune in to live virtual events, and connect online for troop meetings and projects.

Outdoor Skills Week & Family Camp-In

In May, we hosted a Virtual Outdoor Skills Week and Family Camp-In to give girls the opportunity to learn new skills with their families. The event culminated in a Family Camp-In, where families were encouraged to camp in their backyard or indoors.

Girls learned more about outdoor experiences through daily video posts from experienced, local Girl Scout campers. The sessions covered a variety of skills from knot tying to packing for a camping trip, and how to set up a tent to the principles of Leave No Trace. Girls even learned how to make traditional campfire foods, like s'mores, inside their kitchens. From the event's Facebook page, girls were able view the daily posts and share pictures and videos of themselves completing activities at home. Over 85 adult and girl members joined in the event throughout the week!

MAKING THE WORLD A BETTER PLACE

During the unprecedented challenges of the past membership year, Girl Scouts continued to conduct service projects, earn badges, and be leaders in our community. Here are just a few of the ways our Girl Scouts continued to serve others over the year.

Giving to Other Children

When schools closed and quarantine began, Hannah, a Girl Scout Daisy, wanted to find a way to help kids in her neighborhood. She and her mom purchased bike helmets and hung them on the fence at the local park for anyone that needed one. Hannah also set up a free library of books on her driveway to share with her neighborhood.



When she noticed that there were not enough children's books available in her community that

featured protagonists of color, Girl Scout Cadette Jamyah decided to collect books featuring characters of diverse backgrounds. She then mailed the books to other children to enjoy while at home. Her act of kindness ensures more children can discover books that represent different abilities, cultures, beliefs, and skin colors and works to change attitudes toward those differences.



Keeping Others Safe


When mask mandates went into place, Girl Scouts took action and began sewing masks to give away in their communities.

SUMMER PROGRAMS - VIRTUALLY

Summer Adventure 2020

As the year progressed and the pandemic continued, council leadership faced the difficult decision of canceling all in-person summer camp programming. In it's place we introduced Summer Adventure 2020, which offered girls the camp-life experience, including skill-building, adventure, and fun, from the comfort of their own homes! The program was led by our Camp Koch Outdoor Team, GSUSA, and councils across the country. The four-week program included virtual sessions, live online events, and hands-on program activities, and culminated in a virtual week at Camp Koch.

In order to allow girls to have a camp experience while at home, GSSI's Camp Koch staff spent a week recreating and recording a typical camp session. Videos included tours of camp landmarks, and an introduction to the different buildings and facilities like the platform tent areas, Dining Hall, and swimming area. They also demonstrated outdoor skills like setting up a platform tent, campsite fire safety, water safety, and knife safety. Girls learned traditional camp activities

June 24, 2020

On June 24, GSSI hosted a virtual day of remembrance to mark the one-year anniversary of the tragic incident at Camp Koch in 2019. The memorial, set in a clearing near the Fairy Garden, includes a painted rock garden, a bench donated by Troop 670, and a rain stick that can be turned to create a moment of peace for anyone visiting the space. Prior to the day, council staff also visited the first responders in Tell City and Perry County to thank them for their service. Girl Scouts of Southwest Indiana's signature event, Women of Distinction, was originally scheduled for March 13, 2020. Facing a last-minute change to an event that had been planned for months, council leadership decided the event would be postponed until May. As the pandemic continued, once again the event was rescheduled - but this time as a virtual event. Despite the challenges in scheduling, the 2020 event





took place on September 30, and combined both live and pre-recorded segments. The shift allowed us to safely honor our award winners for their accomplishments, community stewardship, and commitment to making a positive difference for the next generation of girls. The proceeds from Women of Distinction supported the Girl Scout Leadership Program, ensuring that all girls in our local communities have the support, experiences, and opportunities they need to realize their potential.



Our Girl Scout Leadership Experience is a one-of-a-kind leadership development program for girls, with proven results. It is based on time-tested methods and research-backed programming that help girls take the lead—in their own lives and in the world. If we truly want to make the world a better place, we need to make sure that every girl has a chance. That means ALL girls, from every zip code—regardless of their economic status. After all, it's part of the Girl Scout mission! To empower every girl, we need to serve families of diverse socioeconomic backgrounds in southwest Indiana. That's why we offer various in-school, after-school, and community staff-led programs. By working to eliminate barriers to participation, we're striving to ensure that Girl Scouts is for every girl.

Outreach Program

Last year, GSSI's outreach program served 715 girls in under-served communities, providing direct access to the Girl Scout Leadership Experience. Program sites included Title I Schools in the Evansville Vanderburgh School Corporation. The program focuses on STEM, health and wellness, and financial literacy. Girls also learn interpersonal and life skills, such as communication, online safety, and anti-bullying.

Tess Ferguson, Langerhans Awareness

At the age of 4, my god-brother Ty was diagnosed with Langerhans Cell Histiocytosis. He gradually became physically disabled, and it kept him apart from his peers. I created blankets and stuffed animal clothes for him while he was in the hospital and it would brighten his day. Most kids don't have this experience growing up, and are uninformed of the hardships and struggles of this disease. My project worked to educate people about Langerhans, brought awareness around the struggles people with this disease endure, and encouraged the community to come together to help ease the hardships for children in the hospital; just as I used to do for Ty.



Abbigail Keller, Bed Bug Crisis



Many shelters experience bed bugs due to the high volume of individuals coming in and out of these shelters. I started a process at the House of Bread and Peace to eliminate the bed bug crisis by creating personalized cubbies for the residents to use for their items when they arrive. I also created a video to inform the community about The House of Bread and Peace and sent this process to shelters in all 50 states to hopefully help them eliminate the bed bug crisis in their facilities.

Kellie Lambert, Children's Hospital Treasure Boxes

I partnered with St. Vincent Center for Children to create treasure boxes filled with prizes for the kids that attend weekly appointments. This will allow kids to be excited to attend their appointments and give them something positive to look forward to. I plan to create more treasure boxes at the Indianapolis Peyton Manning Children's Hospital and will share this idea with hospitals around the U.S. so they can implement the boxes as well! This will impact the hundreds of children that attend the hospital on a weekly basis throughout the year.

"In today's society, there are many families that cannot afford food. The HOPE Garden produces food to feed over 700 families per year and was built as organically as possible to make the fruits and vegetables healthier. I built 5 arbors at their facility to help HOPE Garden grow vine plants up the beams. This will allow them to grow more food items for the community and reach more people. I also created a step-by-step process to share how to construct the arbors with other shelters around the United States so that they can use the same system at their facilities.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are at the very heart of Girl Scouts. They do incredible work every day—as administrative volunteers, episodic volunteers, and troop leaders—to bring the Girl Scout experience to life. Whether girls are collaborating on badge activities, going on outdoor adventures, earning their Highest Awards, or working together on community projects, it's volunteers who are ensuring that they are prepared to meet any challenge with confidence, compassion, and success.

To be a Girl Scout volunteer is to be a change-maker. That's why Girl Scout volunteers are our heroes. Their belief in the power of girls makes all the difference. They are cheerleaders, guides, and mentors—and as any Girl Scout volunteer will tell you, volunteers get as much out of Girl Scouts as the girls.

Volunteer Leadership Summit

In November, we held the annual GSSI Volunteer Leadership Summit, a networking and learning opportunity for volunteers. Discussion topics included best practices for risk management and implementing our four pillars: STEM, Outdoors, Entrepreneurship, and Life Skills.

Supporting Our Volunteers During the Pandemic

When COVID-19 hit, we pivoted our volunteer support strategy to help navigate the uncharted waters of leading Girl Scouts during a pandemic. Below are just some of the new tactics.

- Tips and Tricks for Troop Leaders Video Series: Beginning in the spring, we posted weekly videos for troop leaders that covered topics to help them continue to lead their troops. Videos covered a range of subjects and virtual platforms, including Girl Scout basics like the Four Pillars, programming resources like the Badge Explorer, and administrative lessons like managing troop funds. - Volunteer Check-in Calls: During the spring and summer, the GSSI membership team made calls to all troop leaders to check in, thank them for their service, and share new resources available to them during the pandemic.
- **Girl Scouts at Home:** In addition to at-home badge programming for girls, GSSI and GSUSA created online resources for parents, guardians, and volunteers.
- Virtual Networking Events for Troop Leaders: In May and June, the Troop Support team held four grade level-specific (Daisy, Brownie, Junior, and Cadettes/Seniors/Ambassadors) virtual networking sessions via Zoom. These sessions allowed volunteers to ask questions, share


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
