As many of you know, it was certainly a difficult year for Girl Scouts of Southwest Indiana (GSSI). There are no words to describe the pain and sadness our council experienced in 2019. However, in the darkness we saw our Girl Scout light shine as we came together to provide support, comfort, and love to our Girl Scout sisters and their families. Thank you for standing strong together and caring for each other – the power of Girl Scouts is inspiring.

Through all the challenges of 2019, GSSI continued its commitment to girls – all girls – through innovative, girl-led, girl-centered programming experiences that allowed girls to take the lead early and often and develop life-long skills, ensuring they thrive now and in the future.

Through the Girl Scout Leadership Experience—a collection of engaging, challenging, and fun activities like earning badges, going on once-in-a-lifetime trips, selling cookies, exploring science, getting outdoors, and doing community service projects – Girl Scouts prepares girls for a lifetime of leadership, success, and adventure in a safe, no-limits space designed for and by girls.

With girls at the center of everything we do, GSSI still had a lot to celebrate:

• New Location: GSSI relocated its headquarters and council shop after nearly 20 years in downtown Evansville. The new facility, located on Evansville's east side, ensures accessibility and convenience for all its members throughout its 11-county jurisdiction.

• Expanded Community Outreach: GSSI increased its impact in under-served neighborhoods, ensuring nearly 1,600 girls in grades K-12 received Girl Scout programs on STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math), life skills, leadership development, anti-bulling, and health and wellness in a safe, all-girl environment during and after-school and throughout the summer months.

 $\cdot\,$  Global Adventure: GSSI hosted a trip Australia in the summer of 2019 for Girl Scouts in middle and high school.

• G.I.R.L. Media Team: GSSI's girl-led media team kicked off and works to represent Girl Scouts throughout the community at various media opportunities. Media team members built leadership skills, explored areas of interest in communications, public/media relations, and TV/Radio broadcasting, developed public speaking skills, and interacted with local media professionals.

There is a lot to brag about when it comes to Girl Scouts. Our girls, volunteers, and staff are incredible and work hard to make positive changes in our community every day! GSSI remains steadfast in delivering quality programs to expose girls to STEM, entrepreneurship, outdoors and life skills; our annual report reflects some of our many accomplishments in 2019.

- · Develop and maintain healthy relations



The Girl Scout Leadership Experience challenges girls to discover, connect, and most importantly, take action to make the world a better place. Each year, thousands of Girl Scouts execute projects such as collecting food or other supplies for shelters, making fidget blankets for dementia patients, painting murals, helping animal shelters, making cards for hospital patients, and much more. Here are just a few of the many amazing Take Action Projects completed by GSSI girls this year.



In July, Troop 670 traveled to Perry County to honor the first responders for their service to Camp Koch. They presented the Perry County Sheriff's Office, Tell City Police Department Central Dispatch, and Perry County EMS and Rescue with ribbons, as well as some delicious cookies as a small token for their bravery and strength.

- **Troop 315** completed their take action project by updating their local schools planters and helping the local humane society.
- **Troop 490** spent a week paying compliments to family, friends, and even strangers. They would watch their facial expressions to see how a compliment can change someone's mood. They were amazed at how people would smile and their faces would light up.
- **Troop 101** hosted a talent show for local girls to show the community that girls can do anything they put their minds to. They had flute, piccolo solos, dance, photography, art displays, tennis, and swim! They used the money they received from the talent show to create comfort kits for the hurricane victims in Florida.
- **Troop 217** taught local Brownie Girl Scouts about leave no trace and the importance of following this process when outside!

Each year, Girl Scouts take part in the largest girl-led business in the world - the Girl Scout Cookie Program. The Cookie Program, recognized as the most powerful financial literacy program for girls, gives millions of future business women their first formal lessons in five essential business skills. The Cookie Program is the most popular program offered by Girl Scouts. 57 percent of Girl Scout alumnae in the business world say the Girl Scout Cookie Program was a key factor in the development of their skills today!

#### In 2019:

- •GSSI girls sold **370,992 packages** of cookies.
- •The average number of **packages sold per girl** was **178**.
- •The top individual seller sold 2,028 packages.
- •19 girls sold 1,000 or more packages
- •The average number of **packages sold per troop** was **1,478**
- •Average troop proceeds were \$616 per troop.

Our Girl Scout Leadership Experience is a one-of-a-kind leadership development program for girls, with proven results. It is based on time-tested methods and research-backed programming that help girls take the lead—in

their own lives and in the world. If we truly want to make the world a better place, we need to make sure that every girl has a chance. That means ALL girls, from every zip code—regardless of their economic status. After all, it's part of the Girl Scout mission!

To empower every girl, we need to serve families of diverse socioeconomic backgrounds in southwest Indiana. That's why we offer various in-school, after-school, and community staff-led programs. By working to eliminate barriers to participation, we're striving to ensure that Girl Scouts is for every girl.

#### **Outreach Program**

Last year, GSSI's outreach program served 2,443 girls in under-served communities, providing direct access to the Girl Scout Leadership Experience. Program sites included EVSC 21st Century elementary and middle schools as well as three community centers. The program focuses on STEM, health, and financial literacy. Girls also learn interpersonal and life skills, such as communication, online safety, and anti-bullying. Through corporate and grant-funded initiatives, GSSI was able to provide over **\$62,000 in assistance to girls in need**.

**Scoutership Program** (Financial Assistance for membership, uniforms, program curriculum, etc.) Scoutership funds are made available through the generosity of the McKinney Fund, the Duncan Estate, and Girl Scouts of Southwest Indiana. A total of 240 girls and 32 adults were served through GSSI's Scoutership Program in 2018-2019, totaling **over \$5,049 in assistance.**

## Our Highest Award, the Gold Award

The Gold Award is the most prestigious honor a Girl Scout can earn. It acknowledges the strength behind each recipient's dedication to empowering and bettering herself as well as making the world a better place for others.

Research shows that Gold Award Girl Scouts are more likely than their non-Girl Scout peers to see themselves as leaders and to have had leadership experience in volunteer activities, school, their communities, and politics. From elected officials to NASA engineers, business leaders, writers, artists, and athletes – wherever you have found female leaders, you will find Gold Award Girl Scouts!

# 2019 Gold Award Girl Scouts 🦑



**Emma Brandt**, a sophomore at North High School, created Experiences with Horses – an equine therapy program that offers local children with special needs an opportunity to learn new motor skills and gain confidence while caring for horses. The program aims to help individuals build self-efficiency, communication, trust, perspective, social skills, impulse control, and learn boundaries. As a child who struggled with ADHD herself, Emma hopes the healing she received from horses will make an impact on others too.

**Katelyn Brown**, a graduate from North High School, created a kid's coloring book in partnership with Ronald McDonald House for children receiving treatments at St. Vincent's feeding clinic. Each page features local parks and recreation options, helping families from outof-town connect to the Evansville area and find a sense of "normalcy" while receiving treatments.





#### **Advience Betz**, a junior at Northeast Dubois High School, worked over 150 hours to develop and coordinate the construction of the Celestine Park Shelter House. The shelter house offers a safe place for the community to gather, revitalizes the park area, and offers an opportunity for the community to connect in a green space. Adrienne's Shelter House will add value and interest to Celestine's Park for years to come.



**Makenna Goins**, a senior at Pike Central High School, partnered with Jasper School of Taekwondo to create a *Safety in Arms* video on how to protect yourself or save an individual in an active shooter situation. MaKenna promoted the training at a local safety event and offered it to police, libraries, and schools to continue the impact. She hopes students at her school and beyond will feel safe and prepared in any situation.





**Kaclin Holm,** a senior at New Tech Institute, created the *iCanGirls* after-school program at Stockwell School. Her program taught girls that STEM can be fun through circuits and encouraged them to consider a future career in science, technology, engineering, or math. Today only 20% of females pursue STEM higher education. Kaelin even provided circuit kits to other local schools and created a social media page to educate more people about circuits, empowering ir more girls to enjoy STEM.

**Andrea Plump**, a senior at North High School, hosted a special event for Ronald McDonald House to "Fill the Cage" with bottle tabs, bringing awareness to the mission of the organization and helping the environment in the process. In addition to the event, Andrea organized bottle tab collection drives at local schools educating and inspiring 7,460 students and teachers to make a difference in their community. Andrea's efforts even set a record! Not only did she collect enough tabs to fill one cage, a feat never before accomplished within the same year, but she collected enough to fill two cages.



Girls who pursue their Gold Award transform an idea and vision for change into an actionable plan with measurable, sustainable, and far-reaching results. Over the years, Gold Award projects have tackled a broad spectrum of important local and global issues.

Part of our breakthrough Customer Engagement Initiative (CEI), the Volunteer Toolkit (VTK) has simplified the process of signing up as a volunteer and managing a troop, and it provides program content, training aids, and other supportive tools that all volunteers need to be able to deliver a consistent, high-quality experience for the girls they serve. 53% of troops were using the VTK in 2018-2019.

Volunteers can access the information and resources they need through their personal computers or mobile devices and stay better connected to troop leaders and parents. The VTK has made forming and maintaining a troop easier than ever before, which means leaders have more time to focus on ensuring their girls receive the best Girl Scout experience possible. Moreover, we are making the GSLE easier to access and use on the VTK, with sample badges and Journey years focusing on the four pillars of our program that we know girls benefit from most, especially in a girl-only environment.


