Girl Scouts prepares girls for a lifetime of leadership, success, and adventure. The Girl Scout Leadership Experience offers engaging, challenging, and fun activities that get girls learning by doing, while they gain important skills in four program pillars: STEM, Outdoors, Life Skills, and Entrepreneurship.



A brighter future for us all can be a reality, thanks to science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM). When girls participate in focused STEM programs, they become more interested in STEM and careers in technology including robotics, aerospace, app development, coding, and cybersecurity.

Over 37% of Girl Scout alum say they developed their passion and interest in STEM through Girl Scouting.¹



Girl Scout badges covering topics like civic engagement, healthy living, and communication help Girl Scouts grow in confidence as they develop vital skills to lead their best life!

Girl Scouts are twice as likely as non-Girl Scouts to be community problem solvers and participate in civic engagement activities.³

Staff Growth

As we emerged from the pandemic and inperson recruiting, meetings, and activities returned, our staffing needs began to change. We took this opportunity to grow our team and evolve some roles to serve our members better.

Our program team grew with a new Girl Experience Specialist and an Outdoor Experience Specialist. The Girl Experience Specialist focuses on building relationships with community partners for program opportunities, supports girls seeking their Highest Awards, and plans council events, including the annual fall event. The Outdoor Experience Specialist focuses on growing outdoor program offerings for girls, including camps, environmental stewardship events, and community partner programming.

Our new Director of Membership role works directly with Troop Support, Recruiting, and Outreach staff to maintain and grow membership. In 2022, the membership team also added two new Recruiting Specialists.

Camp Programs

Camp Koch came alive with the voices, songs, and laughter of girls this summer as we welcomed campers back for a variety of new programs. Sessions included fall and spring troop camporees, two overnight sessions and a high adventure excursion for Cadettes, Seniors, and Ambassadors, and a weekend overnight for Brownies and up. The high-adventure session included a stay at Girl Scouts of Kentuckiana's Camp STEM, hiking at Hemlock Cliffs in the Hoosier National Forest, and a Deep Darkness caving program at Indiana Caverns.





Celebrating 80 Years at Camp Koch

Since opening to campers in 1942, Camp Henry F. Koch has served as a wooded, hilly, and beautiful outdoor summer haven for Girl Scouts. Here, generations of girls have made lifelong friends, tried new adventures, sang silly songs, climbed hills, and, perhaps most importantly, made memories to last a lifetime. To honor the legacy of this special place, we celebrated Camp Koch's 80th Anniversary with a limited-edition commemorative patch, an 80th-anniversary photo book, and a camp staff reunion held over Labor Day weekend at camp. At the reunion, we also had a groundbreaking ceremony for our new Trailblazer Campsite with Camp Director Crista Owens, Camp Ranger Frank Spangler, former Camp Ranger Jim Efinger, and CEO Aimee Stachura. Community Enrichment Programs

In 2022, we served 1,529 girls through our community enrichment programs, including after-school, middle school, high school, and summer programming with community partners Alcoa Foundation, CenterPoint Energy, EVSC, Substance Abuse Council, Toyota, United Way of Southwestern Indiana, and the YMCA of Southwestern Indiana. These staff-led programs provide girls living in low-to-moderate income neighborhoods an opportunity to participate in Girl Scouting – a chance they might not otherwise have due to limited access to volunteer and financial resources. Programming focuses on STEM, environmental stewardship, financial literacy, mental wellness, and Girl Scout traditions.



Environmental Stewardship Programs: I'm an Eco Friend with Alcoa

In 2020, we began a two-year environmental stewardship initiative courtesy of \$40,000 in grant funding from Alcoa Foundation. Through the I'm an Eco Friend with Alcoa Foundation program, girls participated in environmental take action projects, outdoor programs, the annual Unleash Strong event, and a tree-planting pledge. The program also provided \$75 mini-grants to girls and troops to fund environmental take action projects.

330 girls completed environmental service projects
497 adults were trained to deliver and support ongoing environmental initiatives

Highest Awards

Giving back is integral to the Girl Scout program, and Girl Scouting's Highest Awards allow girls to do big things while working on a cause they care about. We honored our girl award recipients in May at the Highest Awards Ceremony held at First Christian Church in Evansville. At the ceremony, we also awarded \$7,000 in scholarships to our graduating Gold Award Girl Scouts, courtesy of the Bettye A. Statham Scholarship, Donna Decker Gold Award Scholarship, and GSUSA.

Troops Making the World a Better Place Together

Our Girl Scouts find ways to give back to their communities all year. Troop 398

Through a door-to-door hygiene and food drive in an Evansville subdivision, Troop 398 collected roughly 30 bags of items such as soap, shampoo, lotion, toothpaste, and feminine items. They also got about 5 bags of grocery items. The troop divided the donations between Aurora and the Ivy Tech pantry.



Troop 411

After a troop member's grandmother, Karen, passed away, the girls honored her by finishing the service project she had started. They collected the 60 blankets she had crocheted for local nursing home residents, wrapped them, attached cards in Karen's memory, and delivered them as Christmas gifts to a local nursing home.



Unleash Strong: I'm an Eco Friend with Alcoa

In September, we held our fall event, Unleash Strong: I'm an Eco Friend with Alcoa, at YMCA Camp Carson in Princeton, Indiana. The event featured outdoor activities and programs from community partners. Camp Carson activities included canoing, archery and BB guns, a low-ropes team building course, and a 50-foot Alpine Climbing Tower. Other programs included self-defense lessons, a meet and greet with local service dogs, a STEM station with Toyota, Leave No Trace, dinosaurs, and more. Over 240 girls and 150 adults enjoyed the day outdoors.



Introducing GSSI's New Astronomy Club

With GSSI volunteer and NASA/JPL Ambassador Mandy Scurry and co-leader Stacy Blankenbueler, we introduced our new council Astronomy Club for grades 6-12 in the spring. In 2022, the girls chose to study topics like constellations and black holes, and they helped at the James Webb Space Telescope "First Look" event at EVPL Central Library in July. In 2023, the club has planned several activities, including a trip to the Women in Space Conference at the Space Museum in Bonne Terre, Missouri. We want to thank the Evansville Astronautical Society (Specifically VP Scott Connor) for telescope viewing at our meetings and for using their observatory in Lynnville.
